Regionals Next Hurdle For Cross Country Teams

(Editor's Note: the team and individual rankings in this issue are based on results

received by October 12th.)

With two of the biggest races of the season happening in the past two weeks the team and individuals rankings are getting a bit clearer though, as everyone knows, anything can happen at the state meet. Regionals are scheduled for October 23rd with the east meet at Tulsa's O'Brien Park and the west meet at Purcell. The top six teams and top 20 individuals qualify for the state meet October 30 at Oral Roberts University in Tulsa.

There were several head-to-head matchups of top ranked runners but perhaps the most significant was the 2A-3A girls' race at the Jenks Trojan Cross Country Review on the state course at Oral Roberts October 8th. In a rematch of last year's championship race between Cascia Hall's three-time champion, Natalie Gray and Plainview sophomore, Sarah Harvey, the spectators were treated to a classic dual which was won by Harvey this time by a margin of ten seconds. This definitely puts a damper on Gray's goal of becoming the first-ever four time champion but the state meet is still more than two weeks away and anything can happen. Gray was the only remaining defending champion to be unbeaten in class competition.

At the Cowboy Jamboree in Stillwater October 2nd, probably the biggest singleclass race in the state, Enid's Chance Rush protected his top ranking as the top four 5A boys finished in order of their current rankings but Jenks' team victory was a bit hollow with neither of their top rivals, Norman or Edmond Memorial, being at top strength. Holland Hall--unranked since they don't participate in the state championships-was a distant but very credible second. They have one of the top boys teams in the state, losing by only four points to powerhouse Marlow at the Trojan review Oct. 8th. Sapulpa finished second to Jenks at the Trojan Review to earn the second spot for team rankings but the Trojans are going to have to have a good day to win their sixth straight state title with any of the top four teams capable of pulling off the victory.

In the girls' race at Stillwater Gray set a new course record and the Bartlesville girls continued their domination of the 5A division. Unfortunately, Plainview, which

On TRACK

The last two weeks have seen some super cross country racing with the OSU Cowboy Jamboree living up to expectations, notching a girls' course record and a second in the boys' race while the Jenks Trojan Cross Country Review last weekend saw most of the best teams in the state duke it out over the state championship course at Oral Roberts University. Results are elsewhere in this issue. I didn't get to attend the Cowboy Jamboree so photos in this issue are limited to the Trojan Review--I really would like to get a better selection of photos and I encourage coaches to ask their local papers to send some shots if they can.

While I'm on the subject of the Cowboy Jamboree--one of my favorite races if you can't tell--I would like to encourage the small school powerhouses, namely Marlow and Plainview, to include it on their schedule next year. This is the premier open race in the state and is the only time fans get a chance to see actual head-to-head competition between the classes during the season.

Regional competition will be October 23rd at Purcell (West) and Tulsa's O'Brien Park (East). Team assignments were released just at press time and should be in this issue along with starting times. There were some changes in the school classifications based on daily attendance averages and these will be reflected in the regional assignments. Most notable was Altus moving up to 5A; Edmond North electing to drop to 4A since they did not have any seniors; Edmond Santa Fe doing the same thing and dropping to 3A and Lindsay moving down a notch to 2A.

I didn't get a chance to preview the regional assignments prior to going to press but I know the committee was going to make an effort to better distribute the top schools in each division this year. This is a tough job, especially when you consider the fact that they have to take into account both the boys and girls teams as well as geographical location and they don't get near enough input from

the coaches.

I have talked to several coaches who are planning on taking runners to the Foot Locker Regional (formerly Kinney) in Kenosha, Wisconsin, November 27th. Stillwater coach, Dan Zerosk, would like to organize an Oklahoma group and you can contact him at school, 405-743-6450 or at home, 405-373-5578, if you are interested.

The next issue will cover regional results and will preview the state meet at ORU. I still haven't received TEAM REPORTS from all the schools and especially need those with runners ranked in the top ten so I can make sure of their class year and spelling. This is something that will be of benefit to college coaches who want to recruit Oklahoma athletes and need to know which ones are eligible to contact. There is also an article in this issue about a recruiting service which is designed to help athletes of less than super-star status get noticed by college coaches.

I haven't been getting a lot of feedback regarding team and individual rankings which can either mean that everyone is happy or nobody is really paying attention. Meet results are the main source of information for these rankings but I am especially happy to hear from any coaches with information about their own runners. It also may be getting old, but I still have to remind everyone that the rankings are only for fun and that by the time you get the next issue the runners will have decided the results themselves.

Jenks Trojan CC Review Oral Roberts University

TULSA--Most of the best teams in the state showed up here at the Trojan Cross Country Review October 8th to test themselves against each other and to preview the state championship course with the weather cooperating and some great cross

country racing.

One of the best races of the day was the first--2A-3A girls--as defending state champion and number one ranked Natalie Gray of Cascia Hall went up against Plainview's Sarah Harvey, last year's state runnerup and number two ranked this year. Harvey let Gray set the pace for the first half of the race then gradually pulled away, winning impressively by ten seconds and leading Indians to the team title as well. Plainview left no doubt about who is the best girls team in the state, regardless of class, as they would have easily won a combined meet based on the days' times.

The Marlow boys didn't have as easy a time winning the 2A-3A boys race as Holland Hall--looking to gain some recognition since they don't compete in the state meet--gave them their toughest race of the year. The Outlaws took home the trophy with a 44-49 margin. The Dutchmen's Channing Smith was the individual winner in 16:55, followed by teammate Parker

Fleming at 17:02.

In the 4A girls' race McGuinness was impressive in their first 4A only race of the season, notching a 38-53 victory over Edmond North. Durant's Courtney Moody, last year's state runnerup, was the individual winner, holding off Claremore's Annie Forsberg and McGuinness' defending champion, Jessica Hoke, at the line. The Irish's Ashley Boothe was fourth followed by Elk City's Valerie Smith with all five coming in less than five seconds apart in the day's closest race.

The Irish were even more impressive in winning the boys' race with senior Clay Axton notching his first win and leading McGuinness to a 1-2-3 sweep with Mike Connolly and Matt Stuart. Guthrie's Justin Bumgardner got off course while leading the race but came back to finish fourth but the defending champs took the team trophy

28-51 over the Blue Jays.

Jenks' Carissa Nix took back the top ranking with a solid win over Shawnee's Natalie Mann in the 5A girls' race, notching the second fastest time of the day in the process with a 12:08. The Bartlesville girls were impressive again, winning the team title 51-98 over the host Trojans.

The Jenks boys didn't let the home crowd down as senior Brian Young ran the fastest time of the day, 16:08, to win the 5A boys race over Tulsa Memorial's Jonathan Pillow and lead the Trojans to the team title, 50-81 over Sapulpa.



may be the best girls team in the state regardless of class, doesn't participate in this meet which will leave the question of "Who's the best?" to be decided at the first Meet of Champions which will be back on the OSU course November 6th. The battle in this division will be for second with Jenks, Moore and Sapulpa all capable of scoring the points necessary.

In 4A McGuinness is liking their chances of repeating as double winners with both of their teams solid favorites at this point but still facing stiff challenges from Edmond North in the girls division and archrival Guthrie in the boys. Durant's Courtney Moody gets the nod over a tight group of individuals which include Claremore's Annie Forsberg and McGuinness teammates, defending champion Jessica Hoke and freshman Ashley Boothe. Elk City's Valerie Smith has been steadily improving and all this group is within five seconds of each other.

The Irish boys haven't been beaten by a 4A team yet this year and should be contenders for one of the top three spots in the Meet of Champions November 6th at OSU but first they have to get by Guthrie one more time. The Blue Jays' Justin Bumgardner is the top individual in this class with his main competition coming from Northeast's Cornelius Mason and McGuinness' Clay Axton. Altus runners Brandon Shultz and Matt Mios, both ranked in the top ten of 4A got bumped into 5A where they will have difficulty cracking the top ten.

The Marlow boys and Plainview girls still sit alone at the top of their respective 3A divisions but the individual rankings are changing with more runners from other teams moving into the top ten. The Indians' Sarah Harvey is arguably the best girl in the state and gets the top ranking for the first time this year. Marlow's Junior Minson has been at the top all year and stays there.

In 2A Sequoyah Tahlequah looks like the best girls team at the moment and with Lindsay dropping down from 3A their boys stand at the top of this division. Individually Buffalo's Mark Levings gets the top boys' spot and Laverne's Crystall Fuller the girls'. This is a tough division to rank because of both a lack of class only competition and lack of information from the coaches and teams so don't be surprised or disappointed if final results don't follow these rankings very closely.



Scholarship Opportunities Enhanced by Scouting Service

When Elk City's Anissa Jones ended her high school track career last May, she had some impressive credentials. She was the 1993 Oklahoma 3A state champion in both the discus and the shot put. She was a good student as well with a 3.0 grade average but surprisingly enough, not one college had offered her a scholarship. It was at this time she became aware of College Prospects of America, and now she is forever grateful for their services. They identify and promote promising high school student athletes who have the ability and desire to compete at the collegiate level, the grades to qualify, but like thousands of others, will end their playing careers in high school because of an unfair and inadequate college recruiting system. The problems with recruiting run from limited budgets, shortage of scholarships, lack of assistant coaches and rising academic standards. With these limitations, college coaches are not able to recruit effectively and turn to CPOA for help.

Here's basically how the program works. An interview between the athlete, their family and a CPOA representative is held to discuss the program as well as the athlete's credentials. If CPOA decides to accept the athlete, the family then pays a one-time fee and a profile is then drafted listing athletic statistics, grade point average, ACT or SAT test scores, other activities and a photograph. The profile is then sent to college coaches throughout the country depending on the qualifications of the prospective student athlete. If the coach is interested in the athlete, they start recruiting them

CPOA's massive exposure enables recruiters to become aware of athletes who otherwise would go unnoticed. Season ending updates are also provided which allows coaches to monitor their progress. CPOA representatives are involved throughout the process and provide counseling and guidance at all times. CPOA has been very successful in matching student athletes with available scholarships. Other Oklahoma track athletes who have benefitted from the program include Aaron Tracy, Choctaw; Terry Blackshire, Norman; Erika Johnson, Midwest City; Vicky More, Lawton; and Heather Hutchings, Eisenhower. 


